The Kingdom of Christ

Jesus was arrested at night by the guards of the chief priests and Pharisees (cf. John 18:3). He was brought before the Sanhedrin, where the chief priests accused him of many things (Mark 15:3). The Sanhedrin also accused Jesus of blasphemy (cf. Matthew 26:65), as two false witnesses came forward saying, "This man said, 'I can destroy the temple of God and within three days rebuild it." (Matthew 26:61)

The next morning, the Sanhedrin sent Jesus to trial before Pilate, the Roman governor of Judea. They charged Jesus before Pilate as follows: "We found this man misleading our people; he opposes the payment of taxes to Caesar and maintains that he is the Messiah, a king" (Luke 23:2).

The Sanhedrin knew it would be useless if they charged Jesus for blasphemy before Pilate, because Pilate couldn't care less for their Jewish religion; therefore, they charged Jesus before Pilate for treason. Claiming to be king in the Roman Empire was considered a crime of treason because it was considered as usurping (or taking over) a function of the state.

Pilate asked Jesus, "Are you the King of the Jews?" Jesus answered, "My kingdom does not belong to this world. If my kingdom did belong to this world, my attendants [would] be fighting to keep me from being handed over to the Jews. But as it is, my kingdom is not here" (John 18:33, 36).

There are at least two interpretations of

the kingdom that Jesus spoke of. One of them is that Jesus was referring to His kingdom in heaven, which is not of this world. Another interpretation is that Jesus was referring to His kingdom of believers — in whose hearts Jesus reigns. This kingdom of believers is also not of this world in the sense that its subjects do not follow the ways of the world. Jesus said, "They do not belong to the world any more than I belong to the world" (John 17:16).

Jesus' kingdom of believers is a community of believers who listen to the word of God daily and live their lives according to the way of Jesus Christ. On one hand, they live according to the beatitudes: they are poor

in spirit and meek, they hunger and thirst for righteousness, they are merciful and clean of heart, they are peacemakers, they are persecuted for the sake of righteousness, they are insulted and accused falsely of every kind of evil for Christ's sake (cf. Matthew 5:3-11). On the other hand, they are neither fornicators nor idolaters nor adulterers nor sodomites nor thieves nor greedy nor drunkards nor slanderers nor robbers (cf. 1Cor 6:9-10).

The manner in which we live our lives testifies to whether we belong to the kingdom of Christ or not. And yet, the kingdom of Christ on Earth is considered is not yet fully realized. The full realization of Christ's kingdom, where all evil and suffering are eradicated, is still anticipated and will occur at the return of Jesus Christ. As St. John the Apostle said, "Beloved, we are God's children now; what we shall be has not yet been revealed. We do know that when it is revealed we shall be like Him, for we shall see Him as He is" (1John 3:1-2). This is an event that those who belong to Jesus' kingdom of believers truly hopes for and awaits.


