Discernment of spirits

In 1Corinthians, St. Paul talks about the gift of discernment of spirits. What is the discernment of spirits and how is it useful for Christians today? In around 1521, when St. Ignatius of Loyola was recovering from his injuries after being hit by a cannonball, he developed what is now called the Ignatian discernment of spirits. As Ignatius pondered about his life, he noticed different interior movements. Some thoughts made him feel happy, while other thoughts made him feel sad. He came to understand that the thoughts that made him feel happy usually came from God, particularly the Holy Spirit, whom he calls the "good spirit," while the thoughts that made him feel sad usually came from the devil, whom he calls the "bad spirit."

According to the Ignatian discernment of spirits, the "good spirit" guides a person towards God, while the "bad spirit" leads a person away from God. The Ignatian discernment of spirits enables a person to identify and choose the movements inspired by the "good spirit" over the "bad spirit."

The first and most essential rule for the discernment of spirits is Matthew 7:20, in which Jesus said, "By their fruits you will know them." St. Paul lays out these fruits in Galatians 5:19-23: the fruits of the "bad spirit" are immorality, impurity, licentiousness, idolatry, hatred, rivalry, jealousy, outbursts of fury, selfishness, dissensions, etc. The fruits of the "good spirit" are love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control, etc.





A classic case for discernment of spirits is when a person begins with good intentions; i.e., a person sets out to do good, but ends up with bad fruits. To begin with, the person was inspired by the Holy Spirit to do something good, but in the process, the "bad spirit" leads the person away from God by bringing doubt, confusion or guilt. Eventually, the person gives up disappointed and disillusioned. In these cases, the person had fallen into the snares of the evil one, especially when the evil one uses deception by appearing to be a "good spirit," but in reality, is a "bad spirit" in disguise.

What are some techniques that we can use to fight the "bad spirit?" St. Ignatius suggests that we must know our demons and to go on the offensive against the temptations of the "bad spirit" by engaging in the opposite virtue. Do not just wait for the temptation to come. For example, if the temptation is lust, go on the offensive against lust by engaging in pure thoughts, develop a liking for holy books, music and films.

St. Serapion of Egypt was renowned throughout the desert for his holiness. One day, the devil appeared to St. Serapion as an angel of light. Hoping to deceive the holy monk, the devil announced, "I am the Archangel Gabriel and I was sent to honor you." St. Serapion quickly responded, "Surely you have come for someone else. Who am I that an angel would come to visit me? I am nothing but an unworthy servant!" The devil, confused and astonished at St. Serapion's humility, didn't know what to do and simply departed from the saint.
