Gird your loins

In Luke 12, Jesus taught His disciples the Parable of the Faithful Servants; He said, "Gird your loins and light your lamps, and be like servants who await their master's return from a wedding, ready to open immediately when he comes and knocks." (Luke 12:35-36)

What does it mean to gird one's loins? In Jesus' time, men wore tunics which were typically long and loose; Therefore, they had to gird their loins in order to prepare for manual work or for a battle. There are several steps to gird one's loins: First, hoist the tunic above your knees, then pull the fabric in front of you so that your backside is snug, and then pull it underneath between your legs to the rear tightly so that your front is snug like a diaper. Then with the ends of the fabric in each hand, pull them to the front and tie them together tightly into a knot to hold it in place.



Usually, servants gird their loins after they have received orders from their master to do manual work. The servants who have girded their loins and lit their lamps awaiting their master's return are those who had prepared themselves beforehand, so that when the master shows up, they are ready to do whatever work the master tells them to do. This level of preparedness reflects the faithfulness and prudence of these servants. According to the parable, when the master returns and finds his servants prepared in this

way, he will be so pleased that he will gird himself, have these servants recline at table, and proceed to wait on them. In Jesus' time, reclining at table was a position of honor

reserved for guests and those of high status. The master doing this for his servants signifies the abundant blessings and honor that they will receive in the Kingdom of God. However, the parable does not end there.

Peter asked Jesus, "Lord, is this parable meant for us or for everyone?" Jesus replied, "Who, then, is the faithful and prudent steward whom the master will put in charge of his servants to distribute the food allowance at the proper time? Blessed is that servant whom his master on arrival finds doing so. Truly, I say to you, the master will put that servant in charge of all his property." (Luke 12:42-44) Jesus puts His faithful and prudent servants in charge of His "property" and distributing "food." While feeding the poor is important, the context of Jesus' teachings emphasizes spiritual "food" and spiritual "property." Spiritual "property" can refer to the truths of the Gospel, sacred scripture and the teachings of the Church. On the other hand, distributing spiritual "food" can refer to teaching and preaching the word of God, providing guidance and offering compassion and spiritual support to others. The "proper time" refers to the opportune moments to spread the Gospel in word and in deed. Christians are all given these basic duties.


Now, here comes the twist and the warning in the parable: But if that servant says to himself, "My master is delayed in coming," and begins to beat the menservants and the maidservants, to eat and drink and get drunk, then the master will come on an unexpected day and at an unknown hour and will punish him severely and assign him a place with the unfaithful. Even a disciple of Christ can fall from grace, neglect their duties and commit serious sins; that is the meaning of getting drunk and beating the other servants. When Jesus returns and finds a disciple who has been doing this, he will be punished.

Jesus speaks of two levels of punishment: a severe punishment for servants who knew their master's will but did not make preparations nor act accordingly, and a lighter punishment for servants who were ignorant of their master's will but acted in a way that deserves a severe beating. Christians are given their duties in life depending on their individual abilities and life situations. Some are given more duties than others, but all are given duties according to God's will and plan for each and every one of us. The lesson from the parable is this: the manner in which we perform these duties in this life will have a bearing on how we end up in the next.
