
Consistent Prayer

Jesus told His disciples the parable of the persistent widow in order to teach them the necessity to pray always without becoming weary. Those were the key words: "To pray always without becoming weary." (Luke 18:1) The parable depicts a widow who used to go to a judge, insisting that he render a just decision for her against her adversary. For a long time, the judge was unwilling; but he finally relented because the widow kept bothering him. He said, "I shall deliver a just decision for her lest she finally come and strike me." (Luke 18:5)

Jesus said, "Pay attention to what the dishonest judge says. Will not God then



secure the rights of His chosen ones who call out to Him day and night? Will He be slow to answer them? I tell you, He will see to it that justice is done for them speedily." (Luke 18:6-8)

What is not mentioned in the parable, but quite reasonable to presume, is that the dishonest judge must have either kept ignoring the widow or giving her an unjust judgment each time she went to him. But she wouldn't settle for anything less than a

just decision. She persistently pursued the judge until she got what she deserved.

One common misconception about persistent prayer is that one should keep "nagging" or "bothering" God until He gives us what we ask for, just as the widow kept on bothering the judge until he relented. Jesus did not use the parable to make us think that God is anything like the dishonest judge. Rather, He used the parable to draw the big difference between God and the dishonest judge; He made the point that if a bad judge can eventually do something good due to persistence, then how much more will God, who is all good, secure the rights of His chosen ones who call out to Him persistently? This reminds me of what Jesus said in Matthew 7: "Which one of you would hand his son a stone when he asks for a loaf of bread, or a snake when he asks for a fish? If you then, who are wicked, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your heavenly Father give good things to those who ask him. (Matthew 7:9-11)

What the parable teaches us is that we should keep on praying even though it feels wearisome to do so. Persistent prayer is the act of continuously coming before God in prayer with an unwavering attitude. It's not a one-time request but an ongoing pursuit of God's favor and will. Being persistent in prayer means that we acknowledge that God is working in our lives, even behind the scenes.

Do you feel weary praying? Do you feel that it is a burden, more like something that you need to do, rather than something that you want to do? Perhaps it is because we have forgotten what prayer is really all about. Many times, I have heard people say, "There is no use praying. I never get what I pray for." Prayer becomes burdensome when we think of it as a means to get what we want and we end up not getting what we ask for. Prayer is not about getting what we want; prayer is about coming to understand how God works and intervenes in our lives. Prayer enables us to acknowledge our human limitations and our need for divine guidance and strength.

What happens when we stop praying consistently? There will be little or no regular communication with God, there is little chance for a deeper relationship with God and almost no chance to align our will with God's divine purpose. A lack of consistency in prayer distances us from God – I am here and God is there, so far away. Our faith, trust and dependence on God all diminish. Jesus underscores the disastrous effect of our lack of prayer on faith, we could end up with no faith at all, just as He said, "When the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?" (Luke 18:1-8)
